Read Proverbs 26:1-16

Discuss

Adult and Student Discussion Questions

- What stands out to you about this passage?
- In verses 4 and 5, Solomon offers input as to the way we should interact with foolish people. In verse 4, he gives a compelling reason not to argue with a fool, whereas in verse 5, he gives a reason to go ahead and engage. What are these reasons, how do we balance the two?
- From verse 9- how might a fool misuse a proverb?
- As much as Solomon makes a point to warn about the destruction that folly can cause, he points out that to be wise in one's own eyes is to be worse off than a fool (vs. 12). What is the danger of self-determined "wisdom"?

He handles it hard, as if it were another kind of wood, and it runs into his hand. So do profane persons pervert and pollute the Holy Scriptures, to their own and other men's destruction. - John Trapp on verse 9

Kids Discussion Questions

- Several times in these 16 verses, Solomon warns against becoming wise in our own eyes. What does it mean to be wise in your own eyes?
- Why is it so harmful to be wise in your own eyes? (vs. 12)
- We can't find wisdom unless we realize we don't have it. Where can we go to find it?

BE THOU MY VISION - MARY E. BYRNE

1 Be thou my vision, O Lord of my heart; naught be all else to me, save that thou art-thou my best thought by day or by night, waking or sleeping, thy presence my light.

2 Be thou my wisdom, and thou my true word; I ever with thee and thou with me, Lord; thou my great Father, I thy true son; thou in me dwelling, and I with thee one.

TUESDAY

Read Proverbs 26:17-28

Discuss

Adult and Student Discussion Questions

- What stands out to you from this passage?
- How is meddling in other people's conflict like grabbing a passing dog by the ears (vs. 17)?
- In verse 23, Solomon addresses disingenuous speech. He compares this to a silver covering on a cheap clay pot. Can you remember a time in which you said one thing but thought another? How is this like dressing a cheap pot with a silver covering?

If one wonders what it is like to take a dog by the ears, he should try it once. He will never try it again! It is the sure way to be bitten by the dog. There might be an exception to this in a small lap dog; but, "The dog in Palestine was not a domesticated animal; and to seize any dog was dangerous.

Kids Discussion Questions

- From verse 17, why might it be a bad idea to grab a wild dog by the ears? What does Solomon compare this to?
- In Solomon's day, it was common to dig pits and cover them with leaves to catch wild animals. In verse 27, he uses this to give us insight as to how we should interact with other people. What do you think Solomon means when he says, "whoever digs a pit will fall into it" (vs. 27)?

Adult and Student Discussion Questions

- What stands out to you about this passage?
- How would you explain Solomon's point in verse 6 when he says, "profuse are the kisses of an enemy"?
- What insight does Solomon offer concerning meaningful friendship in this passage?

Kids Discussion Questions

- What do you notice about Solomon's description of good friends in this passage? Hint: take a look at verses 6,9 and 10.
- The most famous verse in this passage is verse 6- especially the phrase, "faithful are the wounds of a friend." In what kind of situation might a good friend need to tell you something that's hard for you to hear?
- Real friends are concerned with eachother's well-being. This involves honesty- even when it hurts. How has Jesus shown this kind of friendship toward us?

Read Proverbs 27:13-27

Discuss

Adult and Student Discussion Questions

- What stands out to you about this passage?
- In verse 14, Solomon paints for us a portrait of a manipulator. What is his warning?
- You're likely familiar with Solomon's phrase, "iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another" (vs. 17). Practically, how can you do this for others at Calvary?

Hence the usefulness of Christian association, and hence also the evil of sinful company, for one sinner sharpens another to do mischief, just as one saint encourages another to righteousness.

Kids Discussion Questions

- In Solomon's day, people would use iron tools (like an iron hammer) to sharpen iron swords. With this in mind, what does Solomon mean when he says, "Iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another" (vs. 17)?
- Solomon was the wealthiest man on earth but he was aware that the things we have won't last forever (vs. 24). If our money and things wont last forever, what will?
